We will look at various definitions of diversity and ways that we can include all family dynamics in our classroom settings, as well as discuss ways that we unconsciously exclude some children and their families.

Make Your Move: Teaching Transitions

Still in traffic... even after you arrived to your classroom? Come find out about some traffic transition techniques that will keep your day running smoothly! We will explore strategies that will actively engage children during transitions to help promote successful movement and reduce challenging behavior. From large group ideas to creating individualized support, we will see how visuals will guide your way to the end of the day! Using hands-on and make-n-take activities, participants will be given strategies, materials, and techniques that will help promote successful transitions, everything from drop-off to pick up, is covered!

I've Had it up to Here: Dealing with Stress and Difficult Situations in Early Childhood

Do you ever feel like you are one incident report away from losing your mind? If so, this is the workshop for you! This interactive training will assist early childhood professionals with identifying ways to effectively deal with stress, encourage parents who are dealing with difficult situations and providing a healthy social/emotional outlet for children who are facing various stressors. We will also discuss the importance of establishing boundaries, utilizing a 'kindness' curriculum and promoting overall positive mental health in the both the home and classroom setting.

It's Time to Play! Are Your Centers Ready?

They need to play, it's what they do! Think about a child in your classroom who is well liked, what do you notice about their behavior that makes it easier for them to have friends? As teachers, we must teach children how to be a friend. The easiest, most developmentally appropriate, way to do this is through creating centers activities during free play that help children practice friendship skills. After identifying the different types of friendship skills, we will develop activities and strategies that you can incorporate into your different centers. Participants will learn how to set up child-directed free play that promotes increased engagement, reduction of challenging behaviors, and purposeful play activities that teach friendship skills.

Morning Meetings with Meaning!

It's only 15 minutes of your day, yet it could feel like an eternity if you are meet with challenges! Morning meetings are a great way to introduce a new skill, sharpen learned skills, and engage children in the daily happenings of your classroom. So much planning goes into these few minutes, let's learn how to make the most of them! Learn how to set the stage for a successful circle time that encourages and promotes active engagement and reduces challenging behaviors. Through hands-on and make-n-take activities, participants will be given great ideas for making circle time work. Come find out what you can do to guide children to be more interactive during your circle time!

Helping Children Manage Their Feelings
